

## TRY 'ATOMS' AS A CURE

Physicians at Boston Turn to  
That Energy in Fight for Girl, 3

BOSTON, Aug. 24 (AP)—The medical profession turned today to atomic energy in a last-ditch fight to save the life of three-year-old Janice Moschella.

The child, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Moschella, was sent home from a hospital three days ago to die after physicians said they could not save her from a malignant tumorous infection of the liver.

After newspaper appeals by her parents, a supply of rare radio-activated phosphorus, 10 millicuries processed on the cyclotron at the University of Illinois, was sent by plane during the night.

Dr. Saul Hertz, Boston specialist and research associate at Harvard and Massachusetts Institute of Technology, who will administer the phosphorus, said the test was "suitable" in this case, since other known methods of treatment had failed.
