ATOMIC ENERGY PHOSPHORUS IS HOPE OF SAVING EAST BOSTON GIRL, 3

Atomic energy will be put to use in an effort to save the life of a three-year-old East Boston girl suffering from a tumorous affection of the liver which has been declared as incurable.

Millions of radio-activated phosphorus, processed on the cyclotron at the University of Illinois

and expected to arrive here by plane this morning, will be injected into the abdominal cavity of Janice Masobella of Bennington street, East Boston, by Dr. Saul Hertz of 144 Grove street, Brookline.

Dr. Hertz, a research associate at both Harvard and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, is the originator of the radio-activated iodine treatment for strabismic goiter, the first successful use of atomic energy to combat a human ailment.

He emphasized last night that the use of the radio-activated phosphorus would be entirely "experimental" but that the test was "suitable" in this case because all other methods to save the doomed child had proved of no avail.

The rare phosphorus was obtained after Janice's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Masobella, appealed for help in an effort to save the life of their daughter. Janice was sent home from a Boston hospital three days ago after physicians said there was no hope of saving her. Earlier her left kidney had been removed, but the tumor cells spread into her liver.

Dr. Hertz explained that the radio-activated phosphorus, which will be brought here in a glass container sealed in a lead box, had been produced on a cyclotron. Ordinary phosphorus was bombarded with a neutron beam, which caused the atoms in the phosphorus to become activated. The theory behind its proposed use, he said, is that the phosphorus will give off radiation similar to X-rays and will eliminate the tumor cells by interfering with their electrolytic system.

Janice was given external X-ray treatment, but they were not effective. It is hoped that the direct injection of the phosphorus will succeed, because the radio-activated substance will drain directly from Janice's abdominal cavity to her liver.
